AN ECO-FRIENDLY PROJECT TAKES SHAPE IN ITS SUPPORT OF THE HOME FOR THE MENTALLY DISABLED DESTITUTE

An eco-friendly project has been successfully launched to support TRUST (Training and Rehabilitation of Underprivileged members of Society), Trichy, Tamilanadu. TRUST, at its Shantivanam facility, cares for over 100 mentally disabled and destitute patients. These patients who come from all parts of India, are poor and unaware of their homeless conditions; TRUST provides free and professional care to them at Shanthivanam. Many of these patients have been reunited with their families (if found) or other foster families. Many of them have also received some vocational training and thus live with self-respect and dignity. AASAI Ghoshala (cow farm) has developed into a valuable facility that is of financial help and therapeutic resource for TRUST . Two years ago, AASAI initiated the Goshala project. Recently, Dr. Subbramaniam (AASAI Director) visited the facility to see the progress. The facility has now 13 cows

milk enough for the

patients. The excess is sold in the local market which helps TRUST raise funds for its core project. The cow waste is used in the Biogas fuel facility which produces one cylinder worth of fuel per week. This again saves money from not having to buy gas for cooking. Soon the plans are to charge the next larger bio fuel unit, which will yield enough fuel to meet the cooking needs at Shanthiyanam kitchen, Please





AASAI INITIATES SUPPORT TO ORPHAN CHILDREN ΑT SEVALYA AN ORPHANAGE IN CHENNAI

AASAI has initiated support to Sevalaya, by providing total support to 20 oreducation and complete living at an annual cost per child of Indian Rupees 6000 (\$150). Total annual cost for 20 children Indian Rupees 120,000 (\$3000). Sevalaya runs an orphanage in the village of Kasuva near Thirunninrayur about 40 kms west of Chennai. It is also engaged in activities for the welfare of the poor and the deprived. It runs a high school for about 1000 students, an orphanage for about 120 boys and girls, free medical center; free library; and, an old age home for destitute senior men and women, a ghosala (cow farm including taking care of non-milk yielding

cows without sending them to butcher shop) and a gobar gas (bio-fuel) plant. These activiphan children . This includes ties are located on a 7 acre campus. All activities (school, orphanage and old age home) are



provided totally free, funded by donations. A noteworthy feature of the organization is the transparency in planning and budgeting/accounts of the activities. A committee of staff

AASAI INITATES ANADASHRAM HOME FOR POOR SENIORS AND ABANDONED STREET CHILDREN, BANGALORE

AASAI is expanding its support to Deena Seva Sangha (DSS) in Bangalore. DSS started in 1930 by Gandhian workers, provides rehabilitation to the underprivileged. Currently, through DSS, our 'Makkala Ashraya Yojane' project, provides support for the care and education of about 20 orphans and destitute children who could otherwise land-up in the city jails. These children are now housed at the Anandashram,' a home for orphans and destitute elderly on Bannerghata Road, Bangalore. The children attend a private school nearby, and receive love and care of the staff of the Ashram. Some of them are hoping to pursue professional careers as teachers, doctors and engineers. AASAI has now

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A Report from Shree Parashara Gurukulam, Mysore By Dr. S. Natarajan President, AASAI, India

I visited Gurukulam of Vishvakshema Trust on August 13th & 14th 2008. True to their ideal of "Integration of Vedic Studies & Modern Education", the Gurukulam functions. e.g., the students attend courses and discourses in Vedic Literature. They also attend regular academic courses on English Literature, Sanskrit, Science subjects and arts subjects like History. More than this, the students participate in Volley Ball, Basket Ball and Cricket. On occasions like Independence Day, the students put up Flag Hoisting,



marching with Band, arrange speeches by themselves & presented before a Chief Guest, invited for the occasion.

The Organizers of the Gurukulam and the residents are not bound by any time constraint - a class may be conducted at 7:30 P.M.! The 'Gurukulam environment' makes it possible - students stay in the buildings of the Vishvakshema Trust - all their activities are in and around these buildings. Food is provided in the same buildings. There are no servants for routine chores. Servants and helpers are employed for heavy-duty tasks like Cooking Food for all the residents, construction of buildings, electrical and plumbing tasks etc.

Vedic learning is compulsory only to a certain level - till about the 8th standard. By this time the 'basics' are done. Students get more time after that stage to concentrate on regular 'modern' education, so that they would be able to compete with students of any other School, and go for college level courses. In fact, it is worth mentioning here about 4 of the past students of Gurukulam. Two have finished school studies and not continuing with the Gurukulam as they are aspiring for Engineering and Medicine, the 3rd and the 4th students are now in College - at the Intermediate levels (+one). These four continue to stay in the Gurukulam premises. They still participate in as many activities of the Gurukulam as possible - I saw them reciting slokas, in the Band Team for celebrating Independence Day, etc., consistent with their attendance elsewhere. All because these students did their schooling in Gurukulam -- training in Vedic Learning and doing Modern Curriculam -- they did not miss out on anything open to the 'regular students ' doing Modern Education only in any institution other than the Gurukulam!

At present the Gurukulam functions from 4 buildings. One of these is owned by the family who formed the Vishvakshema Trust. The other 3 buildings are rented. These buildings are within walking distance of each other. One building accomodates the Library. Another is for conducting classes and living of students. Poojas and some of the Vedic learning take place in the 3rd (owned by the Trust family). The 4th is only for the members of the Trust family, for day to day living.

The Trust was donated a piece of land located about 4 kms from the Gurukulam. It is now fenced, and a little bit of agriculture is going on. Water is available in plenty, with a stream running across the property. The Trust plans to have the entire Gurukulam on this property, with a Temple and herbal plants cultivation. The idea is to develop studies in Indian Medicine along with Vedic Learning. The current strength is 18 students. Ten of them in the 10th standard, and the rest in 8th standard. After moving to the new site, additional strength is planned.

A Few of AASAI's Projects - Miles to go



Project India-60 supports the needy seniors who live below the poverty line. They have no one to care for them, and no sustainable ways for food and health care. India-60 provides care at their own homestead; a meal a day, 2 sets of clothes per year, and Rupees 50 per month, and free medical care.

Sevalaya, Tamilnadu provides totally free education to the poor children and instills in them gandhian values. AASAI has adopted 20 beautiful children providing total support to them. Dr. S. Natarajan visited them this year and handed over our check.



Adopting and providing shelter, care and education to abandoned street children in Bangalore.


Providing support to special needs children in Mumbai to teach them how to become independent adults.


Providing total care to destitute mentally ill and rehabilitating and integrating them to the main society
